2021 HIGHLIGHTS: MAKING AN IMPACT

721 Students in Honduras and Africa

Learners accessed quality education and graduated from one grade.

670 Kilograms of Emergency Relief

"Maxi-Cubes" were sent to Honduras in early 2021following the November 2020 hurricanes. The two "maxi-cubes" contained a total of:

- ➢ 46 computers.
- Multiple computer monitors, keyboards, cables, connectors.
- ➢ 65 kilograms of clothing.



With monies raised by CPI in a "GoFundMe" campaign for hurricane relief, it was possible to support ACH in:

- Providing cleaning materials and food to CAL school
 - communities that were flooded.
- Restocking schools with necessary equipment and supplies.
- Helping 22 families with hurricane recovery.
- Supporting the repair of schools in 3 satellite communities.



Widening Our Reach

In addition to establishing the CAL program in Kinshasa and Kikwit in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, CPI initiated the development of a new CAL program in Sub-Saharan Africa working with and through the Anabaptist Peace Missions Institute (APMI). This is a development that has far reaching opportunities for other Sub Saharan countries and for the development of additional collaborations with other partner institutions and organizations.



WHO ARE WE?

Canadian Peacemakers International seeks partners to join our mission to expand our Computer Assisted Learning (CAL) program developed to support disadvantaged youth in rural Honduras and sub-Saharan Africa. We have seen how education becomes a very effective way to support their dignity, security, and wellbeing.

We have developed this program in close partnership with local organizations to ensure cultural considerations and policy and legal alignment within the laws of the countries in which we work. CAL has been especially welcomed in disadvantaged areas that are isolated or are impoverished where there are with few opportunities to continue education.

In all that we undertake with our partners:

- ➢ We recognize the need for our work to reflect respect for gender and diversity.
- We hold ourselves accountable to the highest level of ethical behavior and responsibility for our actions.

- We are committed to promoting an atmosphere of co-operation and collaboration, and will always work toward, resolving conflicts in a peaceful manner.

Indeed, it is our sincere belief and commitment that in working in partnership on providing opportunities for youth to continue their education without barriers, together we can support the building of strong and thriving communities where individuals and families can live in dignity, security and wellbeing.

HIGHLIGHTS: HONDURAS

The pandemic has caused a health and economic crisis worldwide, with overburdened health systems, widespread lockdowns, school closures, and loss of income that are seriously affecting disproportionately the poor, women, the elderly, workers and other vulnerable groups. Our commitments reached historical levels in the midst of the challenges of 2021. The grace and mercy of God has been manifest, once again, and through alliances with Canadian Peacemakers International (CPI), and strategic allies, it has been possible to help many young people, adults and families of our beloved Honduras. ... We are grateful to all those who contributed their grain of sand in every action that was undertaken to help others.

Expressions such as these from our key partner in Honduras motivate us to continue working diligently to support the building of better futures for those living in disadvantaged areas. To that end, even during the harshest Covid period for Honduras in 2021, it was possible for the program to:

Provide education to and graduate from at least one grade 691 students through the computer assisted learning (CAL/PAAT) program.



- > Utilize hybrid approaches to providing education during Covid restrictions. For example:
 - Virtual learning was provided to students if they had computers.
 - In-person learning was provided as effectively as possible while ensuring safety through social distancing and use of masks.
 - Facilitators engaged students in on-line workshops and craft-making in order to;
 - Ensure that students remained connected to school and each other.
 - Facilitate and develop students' creativity and imagination.
 - Stimulate fun experiences for students during the dark period of isolation and social distancing.

- Promote and support collaboration with the Rotary Club of Indiana to open 2 new satellite centers:
 - $\circ~$ Island of Roatan (actually opened and provided education in 2020).
 - Village of La Masica where inital steps have been taken to create another school. New computers have been provided and a number of sewing machines that are intended for vocational training have been sent.
- Expand the satellite program in Santa Clara. The community provided a classroom and World Vision provided the computers. This is another example of collaboration with local organizations in support of CAL and education.

Plan Grande

Notwithstanding the flooding in various parts of Honduras from the hurricanes in November 2020, Plan Grande has continued to have water issues. To try and solve these issues, eavestroughs were installed on the village houses to divert rainwater into existing storage vessels. It should also be noted that community planning to support community participation in the economic development of Plan Grande were initiated in late 2021. It is anticipated that the plans will be finalized and implemented in 2022.

HIGHLIGHTS: AFRICA

The Year 2021 was an eventful year for the Canadian Peacemakers International [CPI]. In spite of the global pandemic and the inability to travel, the development of Computer Assisted Learning [CAL] Education Program in Africa, the implementation of the program continued. Much of the work was achieved through increased internet connectivity, zoom meetings and teleconferencing.

Democratic Republic of the Congo

The program in DR Congo:

- Established a CAL program in Kinshasa with 38 students and will be opening a school in Kikwit soon.
- Programs are located in Mennonite-operated orphanages and/or churches.
- Kikwit is pioneering a sewing vocational training program that could lead to a career.

Sub Saharan Africa/Kenya

Program planning for CAL in Sub Saharan Africa made significant progress in 2021:

- Patrick Obonde was appointed to give leadership to developing the program.
 - > The strategic Plan is in its formative stages and envisions:
 - Church spaces becoming restorative community centres for education, peacemaking and innovative community development.
 - Building Digital Community Hubs [DCHs] in many of the over 3000 Mennonite churches in SSA that would be founded on the CAL model and based on four (4) pillars:
 - Grade 5 to high school completion.
 - Technical and vocational training.
 - Ministry and organizational management training.
 - University education using e-learning/distance learning approaches.



It is anticipated that in 2022, The organization, structure and management approach will be in place and the program offer CAL education to its first students.

And the doors are opened for new opportunities

Fabiola was part of a family that valued educations. So when the situation arose where her father needed to make the difficult decision between paying for cancer treatment for her sister, and Jr. High school for her, the decision was made to support the health of her sister. When the facilitator of the CAL program in her village -Isaias, learned about this, he approached the father to see whether a free education offered locally that took only three hours out of the day rather than seven might mean that Fabiola could attend school after all. The father was so happy that he could support both daughters. Fabiola was also able to continue after grade 9 and is now in university studying accounting. ACH supports this through a scholarship she earns by working for ACH alongside the accounting consultant to develop strong financial procedures.

My name is Carlos Alberto Méndez Flores. My story begins when I was little. I always liked to help those who needed it most, but I realized that to do this well, I had to study. I learned about the PAAT (CAL) program and was very excited because I could now resume my studies again. PAAT opened the doors to a new lifestyle for me. I currently work as a paramedic in the Meritorious Fire Department of Honduras and I am finishing the ninth grade. My goal is to get my 9th grade certificate and to continue studying anesthesiology.

My name is Victor Diaz and a former student of the PAAT program. I am from a family with limited economic resources and when PAAT became available everything in my life changed. In addition to completing grades 7, 8, 9 and obtaining my certificate, I developed computer skills at the same time. My way of thinking was different and I understood that we can learn in different ways. PAAT revolutionized my life. Today, I am the owner of two motorcycle taxis and also a motorcycle taxi driver. I have learned the basics of motorcycle taxi repair by watching video tutorials on the internet.




HOW DONATIONS REACH COMMUNITIES
